### MESSAGE FROM MR CROSBY, DEPUTY HEAD (PASTORAL)

This week has been a busy one! We have had two extended assemblies featuring Chipping Barnet candidates from the Greens, Labour and the Lib Dems (all parties were invited) and students were given an opportunity to engage with current issues directly and vote on the policies that most appealed to them. On Tuesday morning family members of artist Sir Frank Bowling delivered a workshop on his work to our year 7s and 8s. We have had an induction afternoon for our incoming year 7 students; a taster afternoon for our incoming year 9 students; and a school open morning (a huge



thanks to our year 7s and 8s for playing a crucial role as tour guides and setting such a wonderful example). Year 11s enjoyed their prom at Mill Hill Golf Club on Monday, while our year 13s attended a leavers' dinner on Wednesday evening. This morning it was sports day and this afternoon, the PTA summer fair... I need to take a breather! All of these opportunities provide a range of experiences for our young people to broaden their horizons, build relationships and practise vital life skills.

We also had the pleasure of having ten (yes, you read rightly... ten!) police officers visit us this week. Rest assured this was all pre-planned and there was no emergency to contend with. This follows on from the previous week where the whole school attended an extended assembly on 'Knife Crime and its Prevention' from the Josh Hanson Trust; the message from the mum of a knife-crime victim will hopefully live long in the memory of our students. On Tuesday this week we had four members of the TSG (Territorial Support Group) come in and display all their armoury to small groups of our students, including a dog called Hera. Those who had the privilege of participating in the workshop, gained a brilliant insight into the work of our front-line police and their day-to-day challenges.

Part of the reason for us allowing the police to work alongside our students is to build a relationship between young people and the police. On Monday the Safer Schools Team delivered a range of workshops to our year 7-10 cohort. The talks were fluid and students asked a range of questions, but the brief focused on the following themes:

- Year 7: being a bystander and your responsibility when it comes to crime.
- Year 8: social media and online safety.
- Year 9: violence against women and girls.
- Year 10: an open discussion around criminal activity (this session overran as year 10s were asking so many good questions).



They also started the day by delivering a whole school assembly on sexual extortion (commonly known in the media as 'sextortion'). This happens when victims are forced into paying someone they've met online not to forward compromising images of them. Globally there has been a huge increase in reports of young people being victims of financially motivated sexual extortion. So much so that the National Crime Agency's Child Exploitation and Online Protection centre has issued an alert in education settings across the UK in response to this threat. Sexploitation is usually carried out by organised crime groups based overseas who are typically motivated by money. These groups target all ages and genders; however, a large proportion of recent cases have involved male victims aged 14-18. It is worth saying that parents continue to ask what is the best way to safeguard their child online. The reality is that having ongoing conversations is best: continue to talk to your child about their online behaviours (the sites they like to use, and what they like and don't like and any concerns about being online) and help them to navigate when to unfollow, block or report. It is vitally important to circulate some streetwise safety messages for you to reiterate at home, ahead of the summer holidays:

- · Keep phones and valuables out of sight when out and about.
- · If phones are necessary, use both hands to secure a phone (there has been a sharp rise in phones being snatched).
- When having to use a phone, stop in a safe place with good awareness of surroundings and avoid distractions whilst using phones. Distraction methods (such as holding a menu over your valuables whilst talking) are used by criminals.
- · Limit the use of AirPods and other headsets which advertise the presence of high value phones.
- Be aware of belongings and surroundings in theft and robbery hotspots including Southgate and Oakwood.
- Report any incidents to police promptly when it is safe to do so 999 in an emergency, 101 in a non-emergency or online at met.police.uk.

Like you, all we want is for our young people to remain safe and happy. We hope you continue the conversation at home and always welcome your input into what we provide at school, as well as sharing your experiences, as it will help guide our provision going forward.

We wish you a safe and peaceful summer and look forward to your return in September. For those moving onto pastures new, as Mrs MacDonald said to the year 13s at their leaving dinner on Wednesday night: even when students leave us, we are still here to support, even though you have physically left the building.

### SIR FRANK BOWLING

On Tuesday, year 7 and 8 were visited by members of Sir Frank Bowling's family. Sir Frank is a renowned abstract artist and students have been studying his work in their art lessons.

Born in Guyana (then British Guiana) in 1934, at 19 years old Bowling moved to London. He



went on to study painting at the Royal College of Art alongside David Hockney and R.B. Kitaj. After graduating with a silver medal, he spent the next 60 years criss-crossing the Atlantic between studios in London and New York. Maturing into a master of his medium, he developed a visionary approach that fuses abstraction with personal memories. Now 90 he still paints every day, experimenting with new materials and techniques.


Students were given a fascinating presentation and were able to ask questions about the artist's life and work.

### CLASSICS TRIP TO HADESTOWN

Last Thursday Classics students from years 8-13 took a trip to the West End, to see Hadestown musical at the Lyric Theatre. In recent weeks GCSE Classics students have been studying the last topic in their year 10 course on 'Journeys to the Underworld'. This musical tells the heart-breaking story of Orpheus and Eurydice - the divinely inspired musician (Orpheus) who lost his love (Eurydice) and ventured to the underworld to bring her back to life. He sings to



persuade the king and queen of the dead (Hades and Persephone) to allow him to reunite with his love.

The performance helped us to further our knowledge of the myth and characters. The show itself was visually stunning and captivating. The actors' voices were outstanding, and they bought the characters to life incredibly well. The set design also created the perfect dark and eerie atmosphere to compliment the story.
