Dear Parents and Carers,

New Mount House School Mobile Phone Policy

In line with many schools across the country, Mount House is moving towards becoming a smartphone (and smart watch) free school for students in years 7-11. Sixth form students may bring smartphones to school, but they can only be used in the 6th form common room and 6th form study area, not around the school site. We work closely with external organisations such as Papaya https://www.papayaparents.com/ to support families navigating the challenges of smart phone use in young people. We are also working with local schools in Barnet and more widely and encourage parents to join the Smart Phone Free Childhood Movement https://smartphonefreechildhood.co.uk/ where parents can find details of the impact social media is having on young people.

Our Policy will be that students in years 7-11 will no longer be allowed to bring a smartphone to school, including for travel on the school bus. If students wish to carry a phone for travel purposes, the smartphone free childhood website has recommendations of **simple** phones to suit all price brackets: https://smartphonefreechildhood.co.uk/alternatives. Additionally, parents who wish to know their child's location can purchase an apple air tag which can be attached to their child's keys or rucksack. Simple phones will be handed in when students arrive at school, and collected when students leave the school site. Should students wish to phone home during the school day, they may ask at Reception. The majority of secondary age students have access to a laptop or iPad at home, and through this they can access educational apps. As current parents are aware, student homework is written in planners and is also published on an app Satchel One; this will continue to be the case. The School is currently developing a student device policy which we expect to share with parents before January 2025.

While the School can have no jurisdiction over smart phone use at home, we are asking all our parents not to purchase smart phones for children prior to the end of Year 11. We recognise that there will be a transition period while this policy works through as many of our students, particularly in Year 9 and above, already have smartphones. Even if your child does have access to a smartphone at home, we would like to be clear that it is our expectation that our students in years 7, 8 and 9 in the school year 2024/5 should not be given access to social media platforms such as Snapchat and TikTok. Parents should check their children's messages regularly, and under **no circumstances should parents allow students access to any group chats**.

We accept that many families have already purchased smart devices for their children and will bring in this policy over two years. You can find the details in the table below:.
